PTA PROGRAM ACHIEVES 100 PERCENT PASS RATE

Graduates of Seminole State College's Physical Therapist Assistant program recently achieved a 100 percent pass rate on their licensure exams from the Oklahoma Medical Board.

This marks the second year in a row for SSC's PTA program to achieve a perfect pass rate.

"This cohort demonstrated true grit and resilience throughout the program and into their clinical experiences. We received excellent feedback from our clinical partners regarding their performance and expect that they will all have bright careers in the field of physical therapy," Shakira Stafford, SSC PTA Program Director, said.

Each 2023 graduate is either already working in the field or continuing their education. Matt Ramirez is working as a pediatric therapist at OKC Speech, LLC in the Oklahoma City-metro area;

Chris Howell is working in outpatient care with Athletico Physical Therapy in Shawnee; Summer Ralston is working in outpatient care with Excel Therapy in Durant; and Megan Whited is pursuing her bachelor's degree at the University of Oklahoma and plans to work in an outpatient setting.

The PTA program is sequenced so that students take their prerequisite coursework first and are then admitted into the technical portion of the program. The technical portion consists of physical therapy coursework and on-site clinical education that can be completed in 11 months. Graduates of the program receive an Associate Degree of Applied Science and are eligible to take the licensure examination to become a Physical Therapist Assistant. The program is housed at Shawnee's Gordon Cooper Technology Center.

NURSING PROGRAM RECEIVES MILLION-DOLLAR GRANT

Seminole State College's nursing program was recently awarded a congressionally-directed grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) in the amount of \$1,050,000. The grant, to be distributed over the next three years, is set to bring transformative changes to SSC's Nursing Department, particularly focusing on the development and expansion of simulation labs.

Crystal Bray, Chair of the Health Sciences Division and Nursing Program Director, said, "This grant will give students the opportunity to work on a variety of clinical skill sets and work with a variety of patients through simulation that they may not always see in a hospital setting when they're doing their clinicals."

This multi-faceted initiative will involve the reconstruction of SSC's ex-

isting nursing laboratory, converting it into a cutting-edge simulation lab. Four specialized rooms, designed to replicate hospital environments, will provide students with a realistic setting for hands-on learning. Two of these rooms will feature audio and video capabilities, enabling students to engage in real-time patient care simulations, complete with one-way mirrors and interactive technologies.

"Students will be able to make decisions on their own on a mannequin in a safe environment," Bray said.

A significant portion of the grant will be directed towards the acquisition of high-fidelity mannequins that simulate various medical conditions, delivering a lifelike and immersive learning experience. The mannequins will perform actions ranging from walking to having seizures, providing students with an array of potential patient scenarios.

Bray highlighted the grant's significance in bridging the gap between training mannequins and real-world patients, "This shift aims to better prepare students for the challenges of the healthcare field, where they will encounter patients of various sizes and conditions."

SSC is also exploring the integration of virtual reality (VR) technology into its nursing programs. VR-based clinical simulations would allow students to experience complex medical situations and scenarios, enriching the learning experi-

The grant will also fund the purchase of advanced medical equipment, such as medication dispensing systems and computerized charting systems, to help students familiarize themselves with the exact technologies they will use in their

future careers.

The grant award marks the culmination of a two-year effort by SSC's dedicated team, spearheaded by Crystal Bray, alongside former Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Linda Goeller, current VPAA Dr. Amanda Estey, and Vice President for Fiscal Affairs Melanie Rinehart.

SSC President Lana Reynolds said, "We are so grateful for the team that worked so hard on this grant, and we're appreciative of former U.S. Senator James Inhofe for his initial invitation to apply for these funds and his efforts to direct these funds to our campus. As SSC continues its mission to enhance nursing education, the support of HRSA and the grant's implementation will significantly contribute to preparing future nurses for the diverse challenges of healthcare."

SSC TO CELEBRATE NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE AT TRIBAL FEST

Seminole State College will host Tribal Fest on Nov. 1 from 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. on campus. The event is organized and sponsored by the College's federal grant programs: Student Support Services/SSS STEM, Talent Search, GEAR UP, NASNTI and Upward Bound.

Tribal Fest's opening ceremony will feature comments from Seminole Nation Chief Lewis Johnson in the Cook Commons, the courtyard outside of the David Boren Library. Chief Johnson was elected in 2021. He has more than 30 years of experience in tribal government. Prior to his current position, Chief Johnson served as Assistant Chief, served two terms on the General Council and was a Band Chief for the Tallahassee Band.

In the Commons, several tribes will have booths set up, providing information on resources available for education, career, housing, nutrition, graduation regalia and more. The Citizen Potawatomi, Choctaw, Sac and Fox, Muscogee, Chickasaw, Seminole, Ab-

sentee Shawnee and Cherokee Nations will all be represented.

Between classes at 8:50 a.m., 9:50 a.m., and 10:50 a.m. fancy dancing and drumming will be performed. SSC graduate and Mr. Indigenous OU Asa Samuels will be one of the performers. Tribal princesses will also be present to meet and greet guests.

At 12:00 p.m., Sicangu Lakota rapper Frank Waln will take to the stage in the Jeff Johnston Auditorium. Waln grew up on the Rosebud Sioux Reservation in South Dakota. He has won three Native American Music Awards. He graduated from Columbia College Chicago with a bachelor's degree in Audio Arts and Acoustics. In addition to a musical performance at the event, Waln will also speak about achieving educational and career goals from a first-generation student perspective.

DOCUMENTARY TO BE SCREENED AT SSC

Seminole State College will host a documentary screening of "Searching for Sequoyah" on November 2 at 9:30 a.m. in the Jeff Johnston Auditorium. Following the screening, a panel discussion featuring the filmmakers will take place at 11 a.m. The event is sponsored by the SSC Native American Serving Non-Tribal Institutions (NASNTI) federal grant program. The screening and panel discussion are free and open to the public.

The 56-minute documentary chronicles the accomplishments and mysterious death of the famed 19th-century Cherokee visionary, Sequoyah. Details about Sequoyah's life are revealed through oral stories from five of his modern day descendants. While the history surrounding Sequoyah's creation of the Cherokee syllabary, or writing system, is well known, the film seeks to uncover more

about the man's personal life. The film seeks to answer the question of how did an illiterate man go on to invent a writing system that transformed the future of the Cherokee people? "Searching for Sequoyah" also explores the man's final quest to reunite the Cherokee people in Mexico, the mystery surrounding his death and the legacy he left behind. The film was originally released in November 2021 across PBS stations nationally.

The panel includes Roy Boney, Dr. Todd Fuller, LeAnne Howe, Joshua Nelson, and will be moderated by Professor Jim Wilson. Booney is an award-winning artist and the manager of the Cherokee Language Program. He was selected as a Sequoyah Fellow by Northeastern State University in 2022. Dr. Fuller teaches creative writing and Native American literature courses at the University of Oklahoma. He is also



the curator of OU's Western History Collections. Howe served as a producer and writer for the film. She currently serves as the Eidson Distinguished Professor in the English department at the University of Georgia-Athens. Nelson was the narrator and co-producer of the film. He is an associate professor of English at the OU.

Wilson, the moderator for the panel, lectures in the English Department at the University of Georgia. He teaches First Year Writing and Honors Multicultural Literature. Wilson is a former SSC professor.

SSC's NASNTI grant program is 100% federally funded in the amount of \$450,000 annually. In addition to hosting a wide array of cultural experiences on campus, the grant also provides support for students with disabilities by training faculty and staff in best practices, implementing assistive devices and technology and redesigning foundational courses to ensure they best support online students with disabilities.

NASNTI PROGRAM AWARDED SUPPLEMENTAL GRANT

Seminole State College's Native American Serving Non-Tribal Institutions (NASNTI) program has been awarded a supplemental grant award of \$150,694. The grant proposal was written by NASNTI Director Kay Wallace and includes several initiatives to promote Native American language and culture.

"We are thrilled to receive this supplemental grant award," Wallace said. "These initiatives will help us promote Native American language and culture and provide our students with unique opportunities to learn about their heritage."

The grant will be used between now and September 30, 2024, to fund the following initiatives: bringing the Cherokee National Youth Choir to campus, publishing the SSC NASNTI newsletter in 5 native languages, a roundtable discussion about "Native Language in the Workplace" and a Native American Language Symposium that will focus on "The Methods of AI in Preserving and Revitalizing Native Languages" that will

have a keynote speaker and three breakout sessions with expert presenters/ speakers.

"Kay Wallace's hard work and dedication to the NASNTI program has been instrumental in securing this grant award. We are proud of her accomplishments and look forward to seeing the positive impact these initiatives will have on our students," SSC President Lana Reynolds said.

Since the beginning of the fall semester, the NASNTI program has sponsored multiple events spotlighting Native American culture, including the Osage Ballet, a presentation by "Killers of the Flower Moon" author David Grann, a discussion on Native language and culture by photographer Matika Wilbur and an upcoming screening of the documentary "Searching for Sequoyah" on Nov. 2.

Seminole State College President Lana Reynolds was awarded the Distinguished Leadership Award at Leadership Oklahoma 's Fall Forum on October 19 at the Helmerich Research Center at OSU-Tulsa.

The Forum event centered on the theme "AI: Byte into the Future" and featured several experts speaking on the burgeoning field of artificial intelligence. The forum featured two keynote speakers: Hart Brown, CEO of Future Point

of View, a consulting firm that assists companies in implementing technology to create competitive advantages; and Wilder Lopes, the Chief Architect for Machine Learning at Permion, a company specializing in the development of advanced AI capable of learning and cognitive modeling.

During the forum's luncheon, Reynolds was presented with the Distinguished Leadership Award by LOK President and CEO Dr. Marion Paden.

Reynolds was a part of Leadership Oklahoma's Class XVII and is a lifetime member. The award celebrates exemplary service to the organization over the course of the last year. Selection is based on the nominee's engagement and participation in member events and activities, along with their support and contribution of talents to the mission and vision of the organization.

Reynolds has dedicated more than 35 years to higher education in Oklahoma. She assumed her role as the institution's first female President on July 1, 2017.

Reynolds is also actively involved in numerous state and local organizations, including serving as a Past Chair of Leadership Oklahoma's state-wide Board of Directors. She serves on the Board of the Oklahoma Children's Hospital Foundation and currently co-chairs the Children's Hospital Board of Advocates. Additionally, Reynolds is a member of the Board of Directors for the Oklahoma Academy for State Goals and the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence. Her commitment extends to the Governing Board of Oklahoma Christian University.

Reynolds presently holds the role of Chair of the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education Council of Presidents and serves on the Executive Committee of the Council of Two-Year College Presidents. She is also a Past President of the Jasmine Moran Children's Museum Board of Trustees, the Seminole Rotary Club and the Seminole Chamber of Commerce. In recognition of her community involvement, she was named Seminole's Citizen of the Year in 1991.

She was acknowledged as one of The Journal Record's "50 Women Making a Difference" in the state in 2000, 2012, and 2013. Her continued commitment to education was honored in the publication's "Power 2021 Education" edition, which recognized the top 25 educational leaders in the state in 2021. In 2022 she was named to the inaugural class of "55 Inspiring Oklahomans" and was recognized last spring by the Oklahoma Commission on the Status of Women as the recipient of the Kate Barnard award.

Reynolds is an alumna of Oklahoma Christian College, where she earned her bachelor's degree in English. She also holds a master's degree in journalism from the University of Oklahoma.

The meeting opened with a review of the College's recent expenditures by Vice President for Fiscal Affairs Melanie Rinehart. Then SSC President Lana Reynolds presented her President's Report, which included an update on the College's personnel changes and information about campus activities.

The review and approval of the 2023 fiscal year external audit was the first action item on the agenda. The Board approved the audit conducted by Hinkle and Company, P.C. of Tulsa. The audit focused on College operations from July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023. Prior to the meeting, the report was presented to the Board Audit Committee, composed of Regents Kim Hyden, Bryan Cain and Curtis Morgan. Matt Bauman, a representative of Hinkle and Company, P.C.,

provided a summary at the meeting. The accounting firm communicated that they found no significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. They issued an unqualified — or clean — audit.

Next, the Board approved a new policy regarding compensation and the use of student-athletes' name, image and likeness. Any student-athlete may earn compensation if it is provided by a third party that is not affiliated with SSC. Compensation cannot be provided in exchange for attending SSC or for athletic performance, including playing time or statistical opportunities. Any agreement between a student-athlete and a third party cannot conflict with clauses found in the Student-Athlete SSC Agreement. A student-athlete may obtain professional representation for the purpose of securing compensation for the use of their NIL, but they cannot obtain professional representation for the purpose of future representation in professional sports without risking

amateur status with the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA).

With the final action item, the Board approved the Agreement for Exchange of Services with the SSC Educational Foundation. The document is presented every other year to both the SSC Board of Regents and the SSC Educational Foundation Board of Trustees.

Under the consent agenda, the Board approved program modifications for the

Psychology Associate Degree in Science, the Pre-Engineering Associate in Science, and the Computer Science Associate in Science.

Board members present at the meeting were: Vice Chair Bryan Cain, Marci Donaho, Curtis Morgan and Robyn Ready.

The next SSC Board of Regents meeting is set for Thursday, Dec. 14, 2023.
