FOUNDATION APPROVES PLAN TO BUILD SPORTS COMPLEX

The Seminole State College Educational Foundation approved a plan to begin construction on the Brian Crawford Memorial Sports Complex at their meeting on June 12.

The complex will be constructed on a plot approximately half of a mile west of the SSC campus on Highway 9, adjacent to the new Seminole High School site.

The first phase will be a 7.25 million-dollar project and will include a Trojan baseball stadium and field, training facility, lighting, artificial turf, area landscaping, site dirt preparation, restrooms, snack bar, press box, parking, and a youth multi-use field that can be used for baseball, softball or soccer.

Additional phases of the project will include two youth baseball/softball fields, a parking lot extension, a combo field, a dedicated soccer field, additional restrooms, an additional snack bar and a maintenance building. The Foundation approved proceeding with these phases as additional funds are raised for the project.

The Brian Crawford Memorial Foundation



kick-started the fundraising efforts two years ago with a lead donation to begin work on the complex. Additional major gifts for the project have been secured from the City of Seminole, the Seminole Tourism Council, Seminole Sonic and the Kinslow family, the Parks Family, Roger E. Parks Heart and Stroke Foundation and Citizen Potawatomi Nation.

SPRING BANQUET HONORS ALUMNI, EMPLOYEES AND STUDENTS

PTA ACCREDITATION

Seminole The State College-Gordon Cooper Technology Center Physical Therapist Assistant (PTA) Program was awarded a five-year full accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education. The program is the result of a three-year partnership between the two institutions, and is one of only eight accredited programs in the state. The program was written and developed by Physical Therapist and Program Director Shakira Stafford. "The program is structured as a 1+1 program, meaning students first complete their core-curriculum requirements and then finish the two-year degree plan with a year of concentrated technical coursework at GCTC," explained Stafford.

Entrance into the PTA program is competitive, with 12 students being admitted each fall. Upon admittance, students engage

in a combination of classroom, lab, and clinical experiences. Students who successfully complete this combined training will receive an Associate of Applied Science degree from SSC. They are then eligible to sit for a licensure examination. Upon licensure, students are able to work as a PTA in the state of Oklahoma for a salary range of \$44,872-\$54,691 according to salary.com.

The PTA works in a variety of settings under the direction and supervision of a physical therapist (PT) to develop mobility, relieve pain, prevent physical disability, and promote wellness. The PTA program is designed to prepare the student to perform at entry-level as a PTA.

GLOBAL STUDIES

The SSC Global Studies Program is open to students and community members who are interested in a convenient, economical and educational way to travel. This program is designed to give participants a hands-on understanding of culture, art and history.





ACADEMICS



STUDENT SUCCESS INITIATIVE

Seminole State College's graduation rate has surpassed every community college in the state, save one, largely due to its recent Student Success Initiative.

In each of the three years of the Student Success Initiative, SSC accomplished its goal of increasing graduation rates by three percent per year over the previous three-year average. At the outset of the initiative, SSC's graduation rate averaged 23 percent for the preceding three years.

According to data reported by the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System, SSC's graduation rate rose to 27 percent in year one, 35 per-

cent in year two and 39 percent in year three of the initiative. The IPEDS data shows the most recent first-time, full-time cohort reported was nearly double those of the cohort reported five years earlier.

Retention rates have also increased from 54 percent to 63 percent during the initiative.

The overarching goal of the Student Success Initiative was to build a campus culture that honors the standard of access to higher education and academic excellence, while providing a campus-wide focus on student engagement, completion and achievement.

DEGREE PROGRAMS FOR EVERY STUDENT

SSC offers 18 transfer degree programs. These high quality programs allow students to wrap up their first two years of college at an affordable rate and then take their progress with them to the university of their choice.

SSC also offers five applied science associate's degrees that are designed for immediate workforce entry following graduation.

CAMPUS LEADERS CHART STRATEGIC PLAN FOR FUTURE OF COLLEGE

During 2018-2019, Seminole State College developed a new multi-year strategic plan for the entire institution – a plan to help guide the development of new academic and sports programs, the physical needs of campus and related budget matters. It will also help SSC prepare for their upcoming Higher Learning Commission accreditation visit.

Members of the College's Administrative Council worked with Dr. Bucky Dodd, Director of the Institute for Learning Environment Design – located at the University of Central Oklahoma, to initiate the planning process.

In mid-November, a "Chart-

ing the Future" task force was assembled and met to develop parameters for a campus and community survey to gather data for discussion at a planning retreat held in early 2019.

Those who served on the "Charting the Future" task force were: SSC President Lana Reynolds; Chair of the SSC Board of Regents Marci Donaho; SSC Foundation Trustee Mark Schell; SSC Booster Club President Dillon Robinson; Vice President for Student Affairs Dr. Bill Knowles; Vice President for Fiscal Affairs Tony Crouch; Director of Community Relations Kristin Dunn; Professional Staff Council President

dent Edie Cathey; Classified Staff Council President Toni Wittmann; Executive Assistant to the President Mechell Downey; Student Government Association Officer Alyson Sing; and President's Leadership Class Member Cami Sosbee.

A group of faculty, staff, students and community leaders convened in January to provide their input for the strategic plan. This winter retreat helped the College finalize its three-year strategic plan, which the Board of Regents approved in May, 2019.


The Trojans were undefeated in the Regional Tournament, held in Seminole. They finished the regular season ranked Number one in

ed into the three groups based on GPA – First Team requires a 4.0 GPA, Second Team requires a GPA between 3.80 and 3.99, and Third Team requires a GPA between 3.60 and 3.79.

The NJCAA has also recognized five SSC Athletic Teams for ending their seasons with

a 3.0 GPA or above. Volleyball held a 3.39 GPA, Softball held an overall team GPA of 3.37, the Belles achieved a 3.05 GPA, Soccer held a 3.03 GPA and the Baseball team achieved a 3.02 GPA.

She said that Board Chair Marci Donaho asked that a resolution of support be considered by the SSC Board prior to similar resolutions being considered by oth-

er community organizations.

Within a month of the Board's resolution of support, four community organizations passed resolutions of local governance support: Seminole Chamber of Commerce, the Seminole School Board, Seminole City Council and the SSC Educational Foundation.

DR. GOELLER SELECTED FOR NATIONAL AWARD






