In 2014, I developed a software program for Dr. Brian Thornburg in Naples, Florida for his pediatrician practice. This program allowed him to perform all of his daily tasks involved with patient care. The front-end of the program was developed with C# and the back-end uses Microsoft Access.

In 2020 I developed a math course that helps students obtain their GED. I built it using HTML5, Jquery, Ajax, php and MySQL. <u>https://mygedmath.com</u>

I believe that I am morally indebted to enter the classroom with only the highest of expectations for every student. Therefore, I always try to maximize the innate ability of each student.

It is my goal that no student is left behind and I will always find a way to bring out the best in each and every student!

Teaching is both an art and a science—especially when you are teaching Information Technology classes. No two students learn the same way. For example, during my lectures, I've noticed that there is always at least one student who can follow my logic with no problem at all. However, the students who are shy may never give an indication if they understand what I am saying or not. So, I make it a point to get the class use to answering questions during my lectures. Why? Well, if they know that I might call upon them to answer a question then they are much more likely to pay attention.

I also encourage students to stop me if they don't understand anything that I say. In programming, to be successful, you have to understand every word of the code. It does not suffice to just say you need to do this for the program to work.

For example, in C++ the first line most programs use is: #include <iostream>. What does that mean? Well, to start with it stands for input/output stream. This is a library which contains thousands of lines of code so that the student can use the keyboard and output data/information to the screen. The compiler appends this information (invisibly) to the top of the program as if the programmer wrote the code his or herself.

In summary, I make sure that no student is left behind. Inevitably there will be students that struggle. Then I take time to work with them one-on-one and if I explain something and they still don't get it, I think of another way to explain it. I like to use a lot of analogies that students are familiar with. For example, when I start talking about pseudo code, I like to use the analogy of a cooking recipe. Then I explain that pseudo code is a form of shorthand writing for programmer where the logic is explained but the details of the programming language are left out.
