BASIC INFORMATION

DIVISIONS: The meet is divided into two divisions: Division I is comprised of schools classified as 6A, 5A, 4A, and 3A according to the OSSAA basketball classifications (please refer to OSSAA link available on the website). Division II is comprised of schools ranked as 2A, A, and B.

ENTRY FEE: No entry fee required.

NUMBER OF ENTRIES ALLOWED: Students are not limited to the number of tests they may enter for which he/she is eligible (refer to the **Test Descriptions** for more information), if the schedule permits. Schools are limited to entering **three students per testing section**. Each student is responsible for taking the test in which he/she has been entered. Please make sure students are not scheduled for more than one test per testing hour.

TESTING: Students arriving late for testing will be admitted at the discretion of each testing instructor.

AWARDS

Medals will be awarded for students placing first, second, and third place in each division, for each testing section. Ribbons will be awarded for the Art and Photography contests. Please see pages 4 & 5 for complete details on the Art & Photography contest and awards. A Divisional Sweepstakes Trophy will be awarded to each school with the best overall point record in Divisions I and II. Points will be awarded to the top three scorers in each testing section as follows:

First Place	Three Points
Second Place	Two Points
Third Place	One Point

No points will be in the Art and Photography contests. The Sweepstakes Trophies may be picked up from Tanner Hall Room 500 upon completion and tabulation of 12:00 tests (approx 1:30 p.m.). Medals may also be picked up at that time.

2. Please follow instructions on completing and submitting registration forms online. Art and Photography contestants need not be listed (see specific rules for the Art and Photography contests on pages 4 and 5).
3. **ENTRIES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED AFTER THE DEADLINE Friday, February 19, 2009.**

5. Each student participating in written tests should bring two soft lead (#2) pencils.
6. All test answer sheets as well as entries into the Art and Photography contests must include the student's name, school, and division. *Entries and answer sheets are subject to disqualification if information is not included, or if information is illegible.*

RULES FOR ART

CATEGORIES

1. **PAINTING** - watercolors, tempera, acrylics, oils and mixed media
2. **SCULPTURE** – ceramics, sculpture, mobiles, puppetry, weaving, etc.
3. **DRAWING** – a) **Black and White Media** b) **Colored Media**
(Black and White **and** Colored Media will be combined in Division II)

GENERAL RULES

1. Students may enter any category, but the total number of projects per student is limited to two (2). The total number of works per school is unlimited as long as the two-per-student rule is followed.
2. Work submitted for judging must have been completed since the last Interscholastic Meet at Seminole State College.
3. Art entries do not need to be matted for entry.
4. All entries must have the following information attached with the artwork: **STUDENT'S NAME, SCHOOL, GRADE, and DIVISION.** (See division information below).
Entries without above information will not be judged.

DIVISIONS:

Division I	Class 6A, 5A, 4A, and 3A
Division II	Class 2A, A, and B

DELIVERY OF WORKS

Art work is to be taken to Colclazier Technical Building Room 104 by 9:30 a.m. on the day of the meet. Please notify the judges upon arrival, they will tell you where the art work is to be placed, according to Division.

AWARDS

First, second, and third place ribbons will be awarded for entries from each Division and category. A **BEST OF SHOW** ribbon will be awarded from each Division, from each category.

JUDGING

The room will be closed for judging at 9:30 a.m. and will re-open approximately at 11:00 a.m. Works will remain on display until 1:00 p.m. on the day of the meet. The names of the winners and their schools will be posted outside of the Judging Room. Note: please pick up your art entries and awards prior to leaving campus. Awards and artworks may be picked up anytime after 12:00 noon.

SSC will not be responsible for retrieving art work.

RULES FOR PHOTOGRAPHY OPEN SHOW

TWO CATEGORIES

- 1. Black and White**
- 2. Color**

GENERAL RULES

1. Division I and II will be combined for the Photography Contests. Students may enter both categories. The total number of photographs per student is limited to three (3).
2. The total number of photographs per school is unlimited, as long as the three-per-student rule is followed.
3. The Photography entries must be current (within the past 12 months) and the students own work.
4. The following information must accompany each entry: **STUDENT'S NAME, SCHOOL, GRADE, and DIVISION plus a PHOTOGRAPHY ENTRY FORM signed by teacher (available to print from website). Entries without this information will not be judged.**

DELIVERY OF PHOTOGRAPHS

Photographs are to be taken to the Colclazier Technical Building, Room 103 no later than 9:30 a.m. on the day of the meet. Please notify the judges upon arrival, they will tell you where to place the photographs.

AWARDS

Ribbons will be awarded for first, second, and third place entries from both categories. One **BEST OF SHOW** ribbon will be awarded, from either category.

JUDGING

The room will be closed for judging at 9:30 a.m. and will reopen approximately 11:00 a.m. for display. Photographs will remain on display until 1:00 p.m. on the day of the meet. The names of the winners and their schools will be posted outside the Judging Room. Note: please pick up awards and/or entries prior to leaving campus. Awards and photographs may be picked up anytime after 12:00 noon.

SSC will not be responsible for retrieving photograph entries.

TESTING DESCRIPTIONS AND GUIDELINES

Medals will be awarded to the top three in each of the following events. (*See pages 4 and 5 for details on the Art and Photography contests.*) Sweepstakes trophies will be awarded to the overall winning schools from each Division. Points will be awarded as follows: First Place-3 points; Second Place-2 points; Third Place-1 point. No points will be awarded in the Art and Photography contests. All tests are for students that have completed coursework for the particular testing section. Students are not eligible for testing in a particular section if they have or are currently taking a course in which they receive college credit. SSC is not responsible for monitoring each student's eligibility for testing sections. All High School Counselors need to enroll their students in the proper testing sections so unfair advantage is not given. Please notify students that they must clearly print their *name, school, and division* on scantron or test answer sheets. *If the information is illegible or omitted, students may be disqualified.*

ALGEBRA I AND ALGEBRA II

All problems on the Algebra tests can be solved without the use of a calculator; however, calculators will be allowed for the tests. Calculators must meet ACT requirements. Students are not eligible to take the Algebra I test if they have taken Algebra II or higher level math.

BOOKKEEPING

No calculators will be allowed. All calculations must be by hand.

GENERAL BUSINESS

The test will cover basic business information such as forms of business organization, elementary economics, and financial and managerial concepts.

CHEMISTRY

Questions on the test will be on high school level with the exception of a few cognitive-type tie-breaker questions.

CIVICS

The civics test will deal primarily with the seven articles, Amendments and Civil Liberties, and the history of the writing of the Constitution.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

The computer science test will consist of questions over basic knowledge of computers, the history of computers, system and application software, storage, networking, and security. The computer science test will not be tailored to any particular computer system.

GEOGRAPHY

This test will cover physical, cultural, political, and economic aspects of world geography.

GEOMETRY (PLANE)

This test is for students who have completed a Geometry course during the current academic year. Students should not enter if they are enrolled in Geometry for the current semester or on block scheduling.

GRAMMAR

This test will cover parts of speech, agreement of subjects and predicates, punctuation, correct verb usage, essential elements, sentence structure, and kinds of sentences.

HEALTH-WELLNESS

This exam will test knowledge of relevant health problems in our culture, i.e., drugs, fitness, human sexuality, and other pertinent issues.

OKLAHOMA HISTORY

This test will cover Oklahoma history since statehood as well as the state Indian movements.

U.S. HISTORY

This test covers both Colonial and recent American History.

WORLD HISTORY

This test will cover general topics in world history, with a major concentration on European history.

JOURNALISM

This test covers basic mass communication, news writing, and editing.

LITERATURE (AMERICAN)

The objective questions will cover the history of American poetry, drama, and fiction.

LITERATURE (ENGLISH)

Objective questions will cover all general areas of English literature. Extensive familiarity with English drama, poetry, fiction, and history is assumed.

PHYSICS

Questions on the test will be on high school level with the exception of a few cognitive type tie-breaker questions.

PSYCHOLOGY

Questions on basic terms and concepts in applications, research, and theory in general psychology will be covered. Conscious consideration will be given to the limited exposure to selected sub-fields and topics explored by general psychology high school texts. Question difficulty will vary in some instances to identify the more knowledgeable student(s).

READING

The reading test will test the skills in the areas of rate, vocabulary, and comprehension. The results of the test will reveal the grade level at which the student is reading.

SCIENCE (Biology)

Questions will be on the high school level, with the exception of a few cognitive type tie-breaker questions.

SCIENCE (Physical)

Questions will be on the high school level, with the exception of a few cognitive type tie-breaker questions. The physical science test is for students who have not taken, and are not currently enrolled in physics or chemistry.

SPANISH I

The entire written multiple choice exam, instructions and responses are in Spanish. The questions range from the very simple to more difficult for the beginning student. The majority of the exam is present indicative, but also includes, preterit, imperfect, future and conditional, as well as the use of object pronouns. This test is for students currently enrolled in High School Spanish I. Students are not eligible to enter contest if Spanish is their native language, or is spoken in the home.

SPANISH II

The entire written multiple choice exam is in Spanish. The student must determine the use of indicative or subjunctive mood. The exam covers the following simple and compound tenses: preterit, imperfect, future, conditional, present perfect, past perfect, and past participle. The Spanish II test is for students currently enrolled in High School Spanish II. Students are not eligible to enter contest if Spanish is their native language, or is spoken in the home.

VOCABULARY

This exam tests the skills of participants in vocabulary. Common prefixes, suffixes, and root words will be included.
