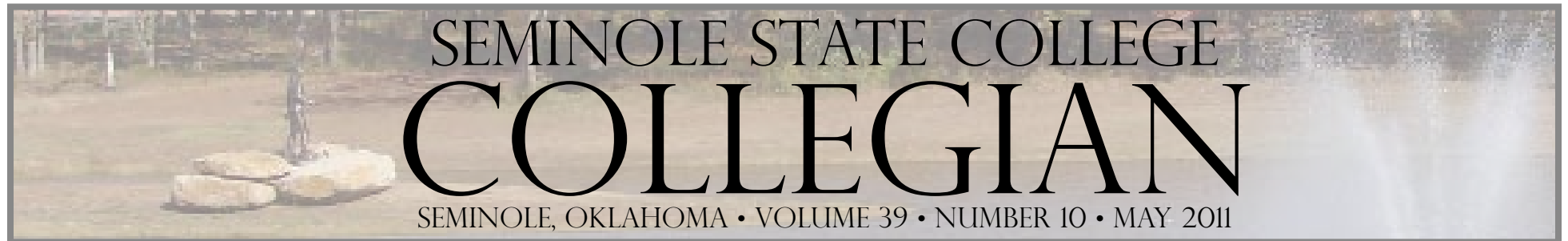

SSC Education Foundation Banquet to Honor Alumni, Students, Staff

The Seminole State College Educational Foundation's annual recognition banquet, set for 6:30 p.m., Thursday, May 5, in the Enoch Kelly Haney Center, will include recognition of college alumni, students, staff and supporters.

Special Awards will be given to long-time associates of Seminole State College Ben and Bonnie Walkingstick and Lloyd Simmons and former students, Adam LaRoche and Robby Trammell will be inducted into the Seminole State College Alumni Hall of Fame.

Former SSC Regent Ben Walkingstick and his wife Bonnie will receive the "Founders Award" for their long-time support of student scholarships and numerous capital construction projects on campus. Former Trojan Baseball Coach Lloyd Simmons will receive the first ever "Distinguished Service Award" for his commitment to students and the institution.

Ben Walkingstick served as Chairman of Union Bank of Chandler, which is now owned by BancFirst. He is founder of the LaGere Walkingstick Insurance Company and retired President of Chandler Insurance Company of Cayman Is-

lands. He has been active in state and local civic activities, serving as City Councilman, Mayor and President of the Chandler Chamber of Commerce. For his service to the community he has been honored as Chandler's "Man of the Year" and "Outstanding Citizen."

Walkingstick currently serves as a Trustee for the SSC Educational Foundation.

The "Ben and Bonnie Walkingstick Student Services Building," which opened last Spring, was officially named for the Chandler residents by the SSC Board of Regents in July in recognition of their significant financial contribution to the SSC Educational Foundation's "Shaping the Future" Capital Campaign.

Coach Lloyd Simmons' recognition as the "Distinguished Service Award" recipient will honor the coach's 26 years at Seminole where he built a dynasty in collegiate baseball. Simmons, or "Zero" – his jersey number and nickname, compiled a record of 1,643 wins and 312 losses over the course of his career with the Trojans from 1976 to 2001.

Bryan Gonterman will be the featured speaker at the 78th Commencement Exercises for Seminole State College to be held Friday, May 13, at 10:30 a.m. in the Raymond Harber Field House.

Gonterman is the President of AT&T Oklahoma. He is responsible for AT&T's legislative, regulatory and external affairs activities in the state.

Gonterman was named President of AT&T Oklahoma on July 1, 2008. He previously was assistant vice president for telecom operations and shared services at AT&T head-

quarters, helping to plan, build and maintain AT&T domestic and global network.

Before that, Gonterman served as the assistant vice president for legislative affairs for AT&T Texas in Austin. Prior to that position, he was the executive director for regulatory operations for AT&T Texas.

Gonterman is a graduate of Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, earning a degree in finance. He serves as a board member of the State Chamber of Oklahoma; the Greater Oklahoma City Chamber; United Way of Greater Oklaho-

ma City; the Oklahoma City Public Schools Foundation; Jasmine Moran Children's Museum and Oklahoma Business and Education Coalition. He is a graduate of Leadership Oklahoma Class XXIII.

Gonterman and his wife, Andrea, have two daughters, Sphia and Isabella.

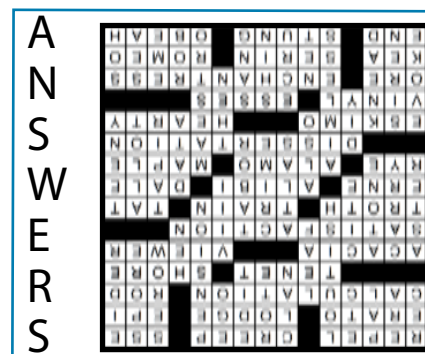
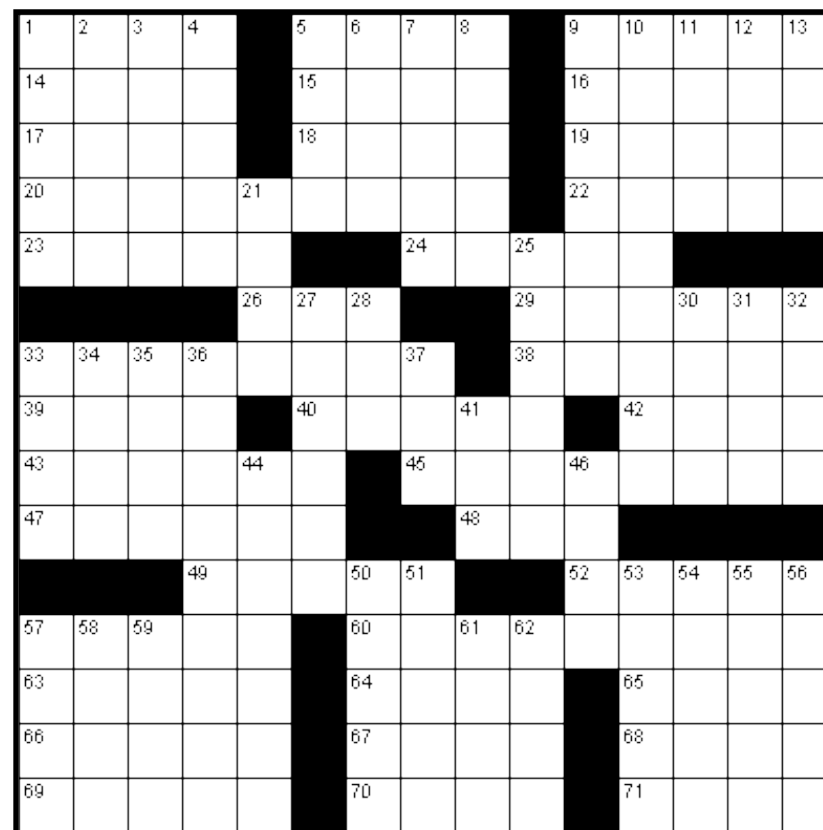

Jordan named National League of Nursing Ambassador

The Seminole State College Nursing and Health Sciences Department has announced that J. Jeffery Jordan, MSN, RN, MBA, CEN, CNE, EMT-LP Nursing Faculty, has been appointed by the National League for Nursing to serve as an NLN Ambassador.

Donna Chambers, Chair of the SSC Nursing and Health Sciences Division, said "We appreciate Mr. Jordan accepting this role of responsibility and for being an encouraging role model for other faculty seeking professional development."

As a participant in this elite group, Jordan will help keep faculty and administration informed about NLN's initiatives, grant opportunities, conferences, publications, workshops and other benefits available to NLN members.

"We created this selective program to make it as easy as possible for nurse faculty and nursing pro-

grams at all levels of academia to understand what the NLN has to offer to enhance professional development and status," said NLN CEO Dr. Beverly Malone. "At the same time, we expect the Ambassadors to communicate to NLN professional staff and the board what issues and challenges are of greatest concern to nurse educators in the field so that we can maximize the effectiveness of our programming and services. The Ambassadors are, in effect, the NLN's 'eye's and ears' on campus."

Jordan who has been a nursing instructor with SSC since 2008, has a Masters in Science in Nursing Education from Southern Nazarene University and is anticipating the completion of a Master's of Science in Nursing in Nursing Education and Administration from the University of Phoenix in October 2010. He is licensed by the Oklahoma State Board of Nursing, Texas Department of

Health and the Texas State Board of Nursing Examiners.

On the SSC campus, Jordan is active on the School of Nursing curriculum committee, Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) and retention committee. He is a member of the Emergency Nurses Association where he currently serves as President of the Oklahoma Emergency Nurses Association and is a member of the Nursing Honor Society of Sigma Theta Tau International.

The NLN Ambassador program was established in the fall of 2006 with an initial cadre of 126 members who teach in all types of nursing programs – practical nurse, associate degree, diploma, baccalaureate, master's and doctoral. Today there are over 700 ambassadors representing schools of nursing in 49 states plus Canada, Guam and the Virgin Islands. New ones are appointed twice



a year to meet the goal of having one NLN Ambassador in every school of nursing.

Observed Dr. Malone, "We are confident that the insight gained through this valuable relationship will help make the NLN more responsive to the needs of our dedicated nurse educators."

Athletic Association World Series, with his last trip coming in 2000. Of those 13 appearance, the Trojans finished second four times. He coached the Trojans to a NJCAA Region II Championship 16 times, and led them to 13 district titles.

During his career at the college, he coached 41 All-Americans, and over 130 of his former players went on to play professional baseball.

After retiring from Seminole State, Simmons joined the Kansas City Royals organization, coaching their rookie team in the Arizona League for six years. For the past three years he has been working as a scout of the Royals, and recently was named an area scout for the New York Yankees.

LaRoche is a Major League Baseball first baseman for the Washington Nationals and Trammell serves as news director for The Oklahoman and NewsOK.com.

LaRoche graduated from Fort Scott High School in Kansas, where he was named All-American in baseball as a senior. He attended Fort Scott Community College before transferring to Seminole Junior College where he was an All-American and the MVP of the Junior College World Series.

LaRoche was drafted by the Florida Marlins in 1998 and 1999 but signed with the Atlanta Braves in 2000 as a first baseman. In 2009 he was traded to the Pittsburgh Pirates where during the season he played with his brother Andy LaRoche until July 2009. In 2010 he signed a one year contract with the Arizona Diamondbacks and now plays for the Washington Nationals.

LaRoche and his wife Jennifer have a daughter, Montana and a son, Drake. His hobbies include fishing, hunting and golf. He is the son of former Major League pitcher Dave LaRoche, who will accept the award at Thursday's banquet.

Trammell supervises state and local new, business and sports coverage

for the state's largest newspaper, The Oklahoman.

Trammell's journalism career began in his hometown of Seminole, Okla., where he worked for many years as editor and reporter at the The Seminole Producer.

Trammell earned an associate's degree from Seminole Junior College, bachelor's degree from Central State University and master's degree in Journalism and Mass Communications from the University of Oklahoma. He formerly taught journalism at Seminole Junior College and was elected to two terms on the Seminole City Council.

He is currently an adjunct professor teaching Media Ethics at the University of Central Oklahoma. He serves on the board of directors of the Oklahoma Press Association and is past president of Associated Press/Oklahoma News Executives.

Trammell and his wife Linda, of 37 years, have three grown sons and two grandchildren. He is an ordained deacon in the Episcopal Church and has served on the Diocese of Oklahoma's Council on Missions.

SSC Campus hosts State Economic Development Partnership Program

Seminole State College was the site for a statewide Economic Development Recognition Program hosted by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education April 26 afternoon at the Enoch Kelly Haney Center. Chancellor of Higher Education Glen Johnson and college and university presidents and administrators from across the state, joined business leaders being honored for their partnership efforts with higher education.

The Economic Development Partnership Recognition program honors outstanding partnerships that lead to significant contributions in educating and developing Oklahoma's workforce.

Seminole State College and the Citizen Potawatomi Community Development Corporation were among the honorees at the event.

The joint efforts of Seminole State College and Citizen Potawatomi Community Development Corporation have had a positive impact on the economic climate of Central Oklahoma, according to SSC President Dr. Jim Utterback.

The organizations' collective work has fostered the growth of existing businesses and assisted with the recruitment of new in-

dustries to the area. The Rural Business and Resources Center at Seminole State College and the tribe's Community Development Corporation are both highly involved in two major economic development organizations – Oklahoma Southeast and Cross Timbers RC&D. The groups combine their efforts to create jobs and provide financing and other services to businesses throughout the southeast quadrant of the state.

The past year has seen continued success and growth for CPCDC and their clients. They made over \$4.6 million in loans to 20 Native American-owned companies looking to start or grow their business. As a result, these firms were able to create or retain over 80 jobs.

According to SSC Rural Business and Resources Center Director Larry Smith, "The Citizen Potawatomi Community Development Corporation and Executive Director Kristi Coker Bias have been a constant resource for the College's economic development office. The two entities share information to assist clients and share ideas to provide economic stability to communities throughout their service area. Specifically, they have jointly worked on

The tribe has also supported capital improvements on the Seminole State College campus through support of the SSC Educational Foundation. Potawatomi Assistant Chair Linda Capps served as a Trustee on the Foundation board for many years and Kristi Coker Bias cur-

rently represents the tribe on that board.

"The partnership between Seminole State College and the Citizen Potawatomi Community Development Corporation has been extremely beneficial in economic and educational efforts. We are proud of our partnership and pleased that our joint efforts have been recognized by the State Regents," said SSC Vice President for Institutional Advancement Lana Reynolds.
