LIFE AND LEGACY OF EISENHOWER TO BE DISCUSSED AT SSC EVENT



SSC Professor of Government Jeffrey Christiansen will deliver a presentation on Dwight D. Eisenhower at the upcoming Presidents' Day event on Feb. 16.

Seminole State College will host its annual Presidents' Day event on Feb. 16 at 10 a.m. in the Utterback Ballroom, located just inside the Enoch Kelly Haney Center. This year's event will feature a presentation by Professor of Government Jeffrey Christiansen titled "Dwight D. Eisenhower: Soldier and Statesman." The event is free and open to the public.


"Few stories of the 'American Dream' can compare to that of Dwight David Eisenhower," Christiansen said. "He was born to humble circumstances, but he would eventually graduate from the United States Military Academy, rise to the five-star rank of General of the Army, command Allied forces in the largest amphibious assault in human history

during the Second World War, lead one of the country's most prestigious institutions of higher learning and be elected President of the United States in a land-slide—twice."

Christiansen has worked at SSC for 15 years. In addition to being a Professor of Government, he serves as Vice Chair of the Social Sciences division. He also is the coordinator of the College's Constitution Day program, a faculty sponsor of the SSC Shooting Sports Club and volunteers as a judge at The Academy of Seminole's annual History Fair each spring.

SSC HOSTS TROJAN BASEBALL BANQUET

To kick off the 2024 baseball season, Seminole State College hosted its annual Trojan Baseball "First Pitch" Banquet February 3 at 6:30 p.m. at the Enoch Kelly Haney Center.

Former Trojan Baseball Coach Lloyd "Z" Simmons served as the event's guest speaker.

During Simmons' career in coaching junior college baseball, he amassed 1,804 wins. He led his teams to an unprecedented 13 trips to the NJCAA World Series, where they returned home as runners-up four times. His teams won 16 NJCAA Region II titles and 13 NJCAA District championships.

He coached 41 NJCAA All-Americans, and more than 200 of his players

signed professional baseball contracts, with 43 of those playing in the major leagues. Simmons was Oklahoma Baseball Coaches Association Coach of the Year eight times during his career and was inducted into the NJCAA Hall of Fame in 1997.

In 2019, Simmons was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame at a ceremony in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

Three former SSC baseball received special recognition at the SSC kick-off banquet. The 1983-84, 1993-94, 2003-04, and 2013-14 rosters were honored for their 40th, 30th, 20th and 10th anniversaries. Members of the 2024 Trojan baseball team were introduced by SSC Head Coach Mack Chambers.

SSC PARTICIPATES IN LEGISLATIVE BRIEFING

Seminole State College hosted area colleges at the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education's Southeast Oklahoma Legislative Briefing at Pete's Place in Krebs on January 26. SSC attended the event with a delegation of state legislators.

SSC President Lana Reynolds welcomed attendees to the event and introduced Chancellor Allison Garrett of the Oklahoma State System of Higher Education.

In her remarks, Chancellor Garrett discussed the importance of higher education in improving the economy and business climate of the state. The State Regents are requesting \$1.1 billion in state funding for FY25, which reflects an increase of \$122.4 million or 12.2% over the FY24 appropriation of \$1 billion.

State Representative Danny Williams (R-Seminole), Representative Dell Kerbs (R-Shawnee) and Representative Danny Sterling (R-Tecumseh) attended the event on behalf of SSC.

Others representing Seminole State College at the event were President Leadership Class students sophomore Dalton Fowble, of Wellston; freshman Olivia Stevenson, of Shawnee; freshman Daylan Saxon, of Seminole; and freshman Jaylee Friend, of Prague; SSC Regents Chair Kim Hyden and Bryan Cain; SSC Educational Foundation trustees Jim Hardin, John Hargrave, Executive Director of the Avedis Foundation Dr. Kathy Laster, Rhonda McKee and Mark Schell; community supporters Seminole City Manager Steve Saxon and Lisa Saxon; SSC employees President Lana Reynolds, Director of Community Relations Kim Pringle and Communications Coordinator Josh Hutton.

The event was attended by delegations representing Carl Albert State College, Connors State College, East Central University, Eastern Oklahoma State College, Seminole State College and Southeastern Oklahoma State University.

SSC BOARD OF REGENTS EXTEND PRESIDENT'S CONTRACT

The Seminole State College Board of Regents met Jan. 18 to discuss changes to the College's bereavement policy and review the terms of President Lana Reynolds' employment. The College's annual Year-in-Review publication was also unveiled during the meeting.

The meeting opened with an overview of the College's recent expenditures by Vice President for Fiscal Affairs Melanie Rinehart.

SSC President Lana Reynolds then presented her President's Report, which included an update on personnel changes, information about campus activities and an update on spring semester enrollment numbers.

The President's Report concluded with a presentation of the 2023 Yearin-Review. The publication opens with a letter from President Reynolds, highlights the top stories and documents campus news over the span of the past year, month by month. The Year-in-Review is available to the public on the College's website, sscok.edu.

With the first item on the agenda, the Board reviewed proposed changes to the College's bereavement leave. SSC's Administrative Council and Human Resources Office suggested removing a requirement of completing probationary employment status prior to being able to access to bereavement leave.

"We felt the time period for waiting to utilize this leave placed an unnecessary burden on employees. This is a small change in the policy but could make a big difference to someone who needs it," President Reynolds stated.

The Board approved the change.

The second action item was the review of President Reynolds' employment. In accordance with Board Policy, the President is evaluated each year prior to the January meeting. The evaluation process is conducted according to the wishes of the Board Chair. Seven years ago, Reynolds was named to the position of President, beginning her tenure in July of 2017.

In December, Board members wrote written evaluations of President Reynold's performance over the course of the last year. She was assessed in institutional leadership, community relations, legislative relations, institutional loyalty and commitment, fiscal management, vision, planning and integrity. It was reported that President Reynolds met with Chair Kim Hyden earlier this month to review performance and discuss challenges and successes of the last year, as well as to establish goals for the coming year.

The Board retired into executive session to discuss President Reynolds' evaluation and contract. When the Board returned to public session, her' contract was extended, and she was given a three percent raise, mirroring the percentage increase full-time staff received last sum-

"President Reynolds has been a visionary leader for SSC. She has demonstrated a commitment to innovation, student success and community. We, as a board, believe that President Reynolds goes above and beyond to foster strong relationships with local businesses and community partners," Chair Hyden said. "We look forward to what the College accomplishes under her leadership in 2024."

Reynolds added, "It has been a privilege to serve in this capacity through both remarkable achievements and tough challenges. I am passionate about this college, our students and our employees, and I am grateful for the Board's trust and support in enabling me to continue to serve."

On the consent agenda, the Board approved the academic calendar for 2024-2025, various degree program modifications and a contract renewal with software company Jenzabar.

STATE REGENTS MEET AT SSC, TOUR CAMPUS



The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE) held a regular meeting at Seminole State College (SSC) on Feb. 1. The meeting was part of the OSRHE's ongoing effort to visit and learn more about the state's public colleges and universities. SSC President Lana Reynolds greeted the State Regents and made a presentation on the college's history, academic initiatives, community impact, partnerships, athletics and opportunities for students.
