Assistive Devices for the College Student

Christopher Reeve, known for his Superman roles in the 70's and 80's was an American actor, director, activist, and disability activist, once said,

“A hero is an ordinary individual who finds the strength to persevere and endure in spite of overwhelming obstacles.”

One of the main objectives of the NASNTI grant program is to focus on helping students in the classroom. For starters, NASNTI has established an Access Lab on campus to provide flexible access to computers equipped with assistive devices and software for students who identify with a disability. What is an assistive device?

According to the Organization for Autism Research, you might find assistive technologies helpful if you need extra help academically in college, whether with taking notes in class, writing a paper, or studying for a test. Assistive technologies include devices or programs that help people with challenges related to their disabilities.

During the fall 2022-2023 academic year, NASNTI will offer assistive devices to students who identify with a disability to help them with their courses. What classifies a student with a disability?

According to the ADA National Network, an organization that supplies information, training, and guidance regarding the Americans with Disability Act, states, *ADA defines a person with a disability as a person who has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities*. NASNTI will strengthen support for online students with disabilities by training faculty and staff in best practices, implementing/offering new assistive devices and technology, and redesigning foundational courses.

Throughout the five years, the program will also develop and pilot new services, resources, and opportunities to promote holistic student development that will support students' persistence through college and prepare them for their next steps in higher education and, ultimately, their careers. As an initiative, NASNTI has established a device loaner program.

How to Take Care of Your Device

Do not leave assistive technology devices unattended.

Do not leave assistive technology devices in cars.

Do not leave assistive technology devices in plain view in homes or leave them in an unlocked home or garage.

Do leave assistive technology devices in locked cabinets or locked offices within school buildings.

Do keep assistive technology device information password-protected (if applicable).

Protect from liquids or dampness and extreme temperatures (i.e., do not leave in a truck or car for long periods of time).
