Seminole State College recently installed a greenhouse on campus to provide a hands-on experience for students. The 12' x 36' greenhouse was manufactured by Yoderbilt and paid for by the College's Title III Grant.

"The entire STEM department is excited to use the greenhouse for courses in Botany, Agriculture, Environmental Science, Plant and Soil Science and possibly expanding the courses we offer to include Hydroponics and Horticulture," Assistant Professor and Title III Grant Specialist Dr. Deanna Miles said.

Dr. Miles launched the project with assistance from Life Science Assistant Professor Theran Hernandez, Title III Director Jeanie Nix and STEM Division Chair Jason Cook.

The maintenance crew, led by Vice President for Fiscal Affairs Tony Crouch, made the greenhouse a standalone lab with plumbing and electricity.

The greenhouse will be available to students during the fall semester.

SSC Hires Interim Nursing Program Director

Brown joins the College in a partnership with SSM Health St. Anthony Hospital - Shawnee.

Seminole State College recently named Linda Brown as the Interim Nursing Program Director for the spring 2020 and fall 2020 semesters. Brown comes to the College through a partnership between SSC and SSM Health St. Anthony Hospital - Shawnee.

Brown most recently served as an Acute Care Registered Nurse at St. Anthony Hospital - Shawnee. She also served as the Vice President of Support Services at St. Anthony Hospital - Shawnee for seven years, the Vice President of Clinical Services at Unity Health Center for 11 years, Vice President of Operations at Shawnee Regional Hospital for one year and the Vice President of Marketing at Shawnee Regional Hospital for seven years.

During her time as the Vice President of Support Services, Brown oversaw a \$58 million, 119,000-square-foot new construction project and a 30,000-square-foot remodel project.

Brown is active in several civic and non-profit organizations. She serves on the Oklahoma Baptist University Alumni Board of Directors, the United Way of Pottawatomie County Board and is a founding member of the Volunteer Health Clinic of Pottawatomie County, where she served as Vice President for three years and completed a term as President.

"Linda's clinical and administrative experience in the medical field make her an ideal fit for this role," SSC President Lana Reynolds said. "The College has had a longstanding working relationship with SSM Health, one that provides our nursing students so many opportunities.

"We are so appreciative of St. Anthony Hospital - Shawnee President Chuck Skillings for his willingness to help us fill this critical role in nursing education. This partnership is a great example of private industry and higher education working together for the common good of our communities."

SSC reached out to St. Anthony Hospital - Shawnee when the College's Nursing Program Director and Health Sciences Chair Valarie Watts received active duty orders from the Army Reserves for a 12-month deployment. While Brown serves as the Interim Nursing Program Director, Assistant Professor of Life Sciences Dr. Noble Jobe will serve as Chair of the Health Sciences division.

Brown began her new role at the College on Feb. 1.

Board of Regents Convene for January Meeting

The SSC Board of regents reviewed the terms of President Reynolds' employment.

At their meeting on January 21, the Seminole State College Board of Regents approved a revision to a policy regarding the reappointment of personnel and reviewed the terms of President Lana Reynolds' employment.

During the President's Report, Reynolds informed the Board about recent activities and events at the College. The President also provided Board members with a 2019 Year-in-Review document which is available to the public online at: www.sscok. edu/2019yearrregents.pdf

Under the first item on the agenda, the Regents approved a revision to a policy regarding how personnel are notified about reappointment. This action changes the obligation to notify all faculty and professional staff by April 15 of each year regarding the College's intent to rehire

them. After the revision, now the institution will only notify those it does not intend to rehire. The change was supported by the SSC Administrative Council, Faculty Senate and Professional Staff Council.

Under the second item on the agenda, the Board retired into executive session to discuss the terms of employment for President Reynolds' 2020 contract. Earlier this month, Reynolds met with a committee consisting of Regents Curtis Morgan, Ray McQuiston and Kim Hyden to receive a formal evaluation of her performance. The committee reviewed progress on goals set last January and provided input on goals to consider for 2020.

Reynolds was hired in July, 2017, but in accordance with Board policy the President's contract should be reviewed for extension each January. After returning to open session, the Board made a motion to extend Reynolds' three-year contract for another year with a 3.5 percent increase to her salary.

"I appreciate the support of the Board," President Reynolds said. "The success we've had over the last year has been a team effort. It is an honor to continue to serve this institution, and I cannot wait to see what we accomplish over the next year."

Board members present at the meeting were: Chair Curtis Morgan, Marci Donaho, Ryan Franklin, Kim Hyden, Ray McQuiston and Paige Sherry.

The next meeting of the SSC Board of Regents is scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 20, 2020.
