





SSC Professor Helps Students Succeed During Quarantine

Assistant Professor of Mathematics Emily Carpenter shares how she assisted students in the transition to distance learning.



Seminole State College Assistant Professor of Mathematics Emily Carpenter continues to teach from home during the COVID-19 quarantine.

After Seminole State College shifted to online methods of instruction to ensure student and employee safety during the COVID-19 pandemic, Assistant Professor of Mathematics Emily Carpenter committed to helping her students make the transition.

She spends mornings working from her home in Shawnee answering emails, making phone calls and using Zoom video conferencing software to meet with classes and students individually.

"I keep telling my students that they need to do what they need to do to be successful. When they have issues or concerns, I try to put myself in their place. I encourage them to make a workspace and to establish a routine," Carpenter said.

Carpenter's routine involves getting her two children, Cayden, 12, and Quinn, 10, started on chores or schoolwork, and then assisting her SSC students any way she can. Her husband, Colby, is the part-owner of the Tecumseh Veterinary Clinic, where he specializes in tending to large animals.

She still meets with her face-toface classes through Zoom during designated class times, records the sessions and then posts them to the online portal for the class for any student who was unable to view the session live.

In an effort to help students with children at home or students with changes in their work schedule due to the pandemic, Carpenter gives her students a larger window of time to submit assignments and take tests.

"Many of my students were nervous about these changes. And I love seeing those students surprise themselves with their own tenacity and ability to learn and overcome these challenges," Carpenter said.

To bolster student engagement, Carpenter has been quick to share her own quarantine experiences with her students. She sends photos of family activities and asks her students to submit the same.

"I asked them to tell me about a blessing they've discovered during this time, to tell me about a challenge they're facing. It's important to stress that we're all in this together," Carpenter said.

Carpenter has also been quick to assist other instructors at the College, many of whom are teaching online for the first time in their careers. She hopes that instructors can work together during the quarantine to further refine the College's online course offerings.

"I think we'll be able to further define online learning at SSC, to improve the experience for students who want to learn remotely in the future," Carpenter said.

Carpenter received both her bachelor's degree in Elementary Education and her master's degree in Teaching, Learning and Leadership with an option in Special Education from Oklahoma State University. She is a National Board-certified teacher with 13 years of K-12 teaching experience. She has worked at SSC full-time for four years and served the College as an adjunct for one year prior to that. Through her many years in education, she has seen the benefits to students when they overcome unexpected obstacles.

"For our students, I think they'll discover this is a personal development. When they persevere through this, there is only going to be personal growth and maturity," Carpenter said.

Ronnie Trout, Business and Education

"SSC advisement was really awesome in helping me get the specific course times as well as my employer allowing me the flexibility to come to class," Trout said.

Trout said the biggest challenge he had at the College was balancing his course work with his job.

"Finding the right schedule, trying to fit everything in and trying to be as successful as possible has been tough," Trout said.

Trout credits the professors at SSC for encouraging him and keeping

"Every professor I've had has been great. Even though it's been 24 years since I graduated high school, the professors have helped me make the most of this opportunity," Trout said.

Trout is a member of the Phi Theta Kappa honor society, which recognizes academic achievement at two-year colleges. He is quick to encourage others looking to pursue higher education.

In the fall, Trout plans to attend Southeastern Oklahoma State in Durant, where he will major in Business Management.

"No matter what challenges arise, stick with it. Don't give up. SSC has a wonderful support staff that can help you get through challenges, make good use of resources, keep your head up and keep going," Trout said.

Seminole State College sophomore Taryn Washburn, of Shawnee, was recently named the Outstanding Social Sciences student for the 2019-2020 academic year.

At SSC, Washburn has majored in Psychology. She is set to graduate in May.

One of the biggest challenges Washburn faced while attending the

College was managing work, alongside taking courses part-time.

"One of the hardest things has been experiencing burnout because I am part-time, so I've been here longer than most students," Washburn said. "I have to remind myself about the reasons I chose to pursue a college degree and keep track of the progress I have made on my degree plan."

Washburn credits several of her instructors for helping her overcome burnout and achieve her goals.

"I have formed so many great relationships with so many instructors on campus. I can honestly say I have yet to have an instructor I haven't liked. A few standouts are Jeffrey Christiansen, Crystal Knowles, Jarrod Tollett, and Jason Cook because they all have undeniable passion for their subject matter, and their students." Washburn said.

She has severed as an officer in Phi Theta Kappa for three semesters, a national honor society that recognizes academic achievement at community colleges.

Washburn said that SSC was an ideal place to start her pursuit of higher education.

For Washburn, higher education has also proven to be a route for self-discovery and self-improvement.

"You're investing in yourself and working to become a better version of yourself through education, experience, and relationships. Every class has something far greater to teach you than only the subject at hand," she said.

Seminole State College sophomore Connor Buchanan, of Seminole, was recently named the Outstanding Language Arts and Humanities Student for the 2019-2020 academic year.

Buchanan graduated from Varnum High School. He is studying language arts at SSC.


The summer term begins May 11. Enrollment is currently open for both summer and fall enrollment.

At their April Board Meeting, the SSC Regents named Human Resources Director Courtney Jones as Interim Vice President for Fiscal Affairs.


Since 2009, Jones has served as SSC's Human Resources Director. Prior to that role, she held the position of GEAR Up Advisor for one year.

SSC To Hold Virtual Commencement Ceremony

Seminole State College will hold its' 87th Commencement Ceremony on Friday, May 8, for students completing coursework requirements for their degree programs. Due to the Campus' response to the COVID-19 pandemic, traditional Commencement Exercises scheduled in the Raymond Harber Field House on the campus of Seminole State College have been cancelled. Instead, the graduation ceremony will be held virtually at the original time of 10:30 a.m. on the College's website, sscokedu.

To recognize students slated to receive their diplomas, a graduation video will be presented to the public. The exercise will include opening comments from SSC President Lana Reynolds, followed by the presentation of graduate names — including academic recognitions and photos, if submitted. To conclude the presentation, messages of congratulations from the faculty will be delivered by Division Chairs Dr. Steve Bolin, Social Sciences; Jason Cook, STEM; Brad Schatzel, Business and Education; Jessica Isaacs, Language Arts and Humanities; and Dr. Noble Jobe, Nursing and Health Sciences.

Students who graduated in the fall of 2019 and expected graduates for the spring and summer 2020 semesters will be recognized during the ceremony.

Nursing Program Receives Continued Accreditation

The Seminole State College Nursing Program was recently granted continuing accreditation by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN). The Board of Commissioners granted this accreditation to the College's associate nursing program and scheduled the next evaluation visit for Fall of 2027.

The program went through the accreditation process last fall, which culminated in an on-site visit by ACEN in October of 2019.

SSC President Lana Reynolds said the news of the accreditation was a positive reinforcement of the great training being provided by the College's Nursing Program.

"Our program has a reputation of being rigorous and producing well-qualified professionals for the nursing field. Having an outside accrediting body compliment the great job being done in this department is a wonderful reaffirmation of their work," she said.

Valarie Watts was serving as the Nursing Program Director and Health Sciences Chair during the accreditation site visit. She received active duty orders from the Army Reserves for a 12-month deployment, which began in January. Linda Brown, through a partnership with SSM Health St. Anthony Hospital — Shawnee, is presently serving as the Interim Nursing Program Director.

Assistant Professor of Life Sciences Dr. Noble Jobe is serving as Chair of the Health Sciences division.

"We want to applaud everyone associated with our Nursing and Health Sciences Division for their work in producing health care providers. Many of these heroes currently working in hospitals, clinics, labs and nursing homes received their training at Seminole State College. We are so proud of the work that they are doing. We are so thankful for them and greatly appreciate their service," Reynolds said.



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College Offers Relief Funds to Students Through CARES Act

Seminole State College has received an allocation of the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund that is being provided by the U.S. Department of Education through the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act to assist students in the amount of \$580,000.

The funds will be distributed to students based on specific guidance from the U.S. Department of Education as well as procedures established by SSC. The money is intended to provide help to students for expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to COVID-19.

Students must be eligible for Title IV federal aid to qualify for this program but do not have to be current recipients of those grant funds.

Students were contacted about steps to take to receive funding, based on their credit hour enrollment in Spring 2020 on Friday morning, May 1. Within two hours, more than 100 students had applied to receive aid. The College projects that qualifying students who were taking 15 credit hours will receive \$675.

There will also be approximately \$50,000 of that money awarded on the basis of need. A separate application will be released to students looking to receive these need-based awards. A Campus CARES Committee, comprised of Leslie Sewell, Assistant Athletic Director and SGA and Food Pantry Sponsor; Christal Knowles, Social Sciences Associate Professor and SSC HELP Center; Lindsay Hernandez, Office Manager, President's Office; Janna Wilson-Byrd, Director of Student Support Services Grant; Marc Hunter, Director of Information Technology; John Bolander, Assistant Professor of Language Arts; and Kelly Hankal, Director of Medical Laboratory

Technology, will be evaluating applications for those funds.

"The distribution of this money is a complex process that involves multiple entities and departments, including the federal government. We are continually and cautiously making preparations to get this money into the hands of our students as expeditiously as possible. We are very grateful for these funds and hope this will provide some relief for our students during this time," SSC President Lana Reynolds said in memo sent to campus on April 30.
