Seminole State College Education Navigation Services: Director Jerry Fry

Establishes a partnership between the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE) and Oklahoma Human Services (OKDHS). The design centers on providing post-secondary short-term education opportunities for both clients in the TANF WORK program and Work Ready Oklahoma (WRO) participants with a child under the age of 18. The primary education driver will be workforce-focused short-term offerings, micro-credentials, and certificate programs at institutions of higher education.

GEAR UP: Director Jonathan Bennett

(Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs)

Designed to increase the number of students who are prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education. GEAR UP provides six-year or seven years grants to states and partnerships to provide services at high-poverty middle and high schools. GEAR UP grantees serve an entire cohort of students beginning no later than the seventh grade and following the cohort through high school. Schools served – Asher, Holdenville, Konawa, Maud, Moss, Okemah, Seminole, Strother, Tecumseh, Varnum, Wetumka, Wewoka.

A Title III Strengthening Institutions grant designed to improve retention and graduation rates of atrisk SSC students through the implementation of transformative learning strategies and classrooms, a Student Engagement Center with new engagement services such as coaching and mentoring, and by revision of 19 high-risk courses.

A Title III Strengthening Institutions Supplemental grant is designed around three activities:

- 1. to revitalize and expand the Computer Science program to bring it up to date with industry standards while adding options in Security, Programming, and Esports
- **2.** to develop seminars (face-to-face), videos/modules (online), and Talking Circles to address academic success skills, technology skills, civic/professional skills, cultural awareness, and wellbeing/resilience
- **3.** to strengthen support for online students with disabilities by training faculty and staff in best practices of supporting online students with disabilities, implementing new assistive devices and technology, and redesigning foundational courses to ensure they best support online students with disabilities.

Student Support Services/STEM: Director Janna Wilson-Byrd

The SSS/STEM Program goals are to increase SSC retention, graduation rates and increase transfer rates for all Gen Ed/STEM degrees for of low-income, first-generation and disabled participants who are enrolled at SSC. The Program provides academic tutoring, academic and financial advising, and grant aid for eligible participants.
