SSC Launches BLAST: A For-Credit Upskilling Series for Working Professionals

Seminole State College (SSC) is launching BLAST, a practical, for-credit professional development series designed for employers seeking to upskill teams and for individuals looking to strengthen their résumés. The course runs during the second eight weeks of the Fall 2025 semester and offers both college credit and digital badging for a program cost of \$100. BLAST (SSC course code BA2301) delivers weekly, skills-focused sessions led by SSC faculty, industry partners and community leaders.

Programs like BLAST are increasingly valuable as employers struggle to find people with the right skills and as job requirements change quickly. Manpower-Group's 2025 Talent Shortage survey reports that 74% of employers globally are struggling to find the skilled talent they need, underscoring the need for practical, work-relevant training.

The World Economic Forum's Future of Jobs 2025 finds employers expect 39% of workers' core skills to change by 2030, making continuous learning and targeted upskilling essential for both organizations and workers.

Learners and hiring managers also see value in short, targeted credentials that carry academic credit. Coursera's 2025 Micro-Credentials Impact Report shows 85% of students who earned



a microcredential say it improves job prospects and 91% believe it will help them succeed on the job, and employers widely agree that microcredentials strengthen a candidate's application. In higher education, more than half of leaders report offering microcredentials for academic credit, signaling durable momentum for credit-bearing short courses that stack into degrees.

At the same time, evidence suggests "skills-first" hiring is still uneven in practice—one analysis cited by SHRM found that in 2023 fewer than 1 in 700 hires came through a truly skills-based process—so transcripted credit and ver-

ified badges remain important signals for employers.

The Fall 2025 lineup includes the following sessions and presenters: Oct. 15, Team Management with Brad Schatzel, SSC Business Assistant Professor, and Cory Crabtee, Mayor of Seminole; Oct. 22, Leadership Essentials with Ray McQuiston, Fulfillment Center Director at Wrangler/Kontoor; Oct. 29, Present Like a Pro with Brad Schatzel and Digital Presence with Josh Hutton, SSC Director of Communication; Nov. 5, Professional Communication with Brad Schatzel and Cory Crabtee; Nov. 12, Sales with Brad Schatzel and Cory Crabtee; Nov. 19, Customer Service Excellence with Brad Schatzel; and Dec. 3 and Dec. 10, Human Resources Foundations with Kendi Cox, Human Resources Manager at Canadian Valley Electric Cooperative.

BLAST is built for employers who want turnkey, college-level training that maps directly to high-demand workplace skills and for professionals who want to add transcripted college credit and verified digital badges to their résumés.

SSC Expands Social Sciences Division, Aims to Launch Paralegal Program

Seminole State College has hired Paul B. Smith, J.D. and Dr. Brenda Prochaska as Assistant Professors in the College's Social Sciences Division. Smith, a former District Attorney for Oklahoma's 22nd Judicial District, will help the College prepare to launch an Associate in Applied Science in Paralegal Studies in August 2026.

Smith served as District Attorney for District 22 — which includes Seminole, Hughes and Pontotoc counties — from January 2017 to January 2023. He previously held leadership roles in the office, including First Assistant District Attorney and Chief Prosecutor beginning in 2011, and Assistant District Attorney from 1990 to 2011.

During his tenure, Smith prosecuted major felony cases across the district, including a 2017 "no-body" child-abuse murder case — a homicide pursued without the victim's remains — that drew state and national attention. He also led or participated in appellate and policy work related to jurisdictional changes following McGirt v. Oklahoma. He was admitted to the bar of the U.S. Supreme Court in 2018, authorizing him to file briefs and appear before the court.

SSC plans to begin the Paralegal Studies A.A.S. in August 2026. The 62-credit-hour program will cover core areas of civil and criminal law, including constitutional law, contracts, real estate and property, torts, family law, wills and estates, criminal law and procedure, and civil law and procedure. Coursework will emphasize legal research and writ-

ing, legal reporting, law-office calendaring and client-trust accounting.

The SSC Board of Regents approved the program in late spring, and it is slated for approval by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education at their meeting in October.

"The program will give students and graduates a practical glimpse into their new legal, governmental or non-profit profession," Smith said. "They will develop the skills to carry out legal work tasks that their attorney bosses assign them. Our graduates will have a keen understanding of the complexities of contracts, civil litigation, criminal law and procedure, Constitutional ramifications of decisions and much more. This will give them the confidence to help those whose lives have intersected with the law."

Before joining the faculty full time, Smith taught as an adjunct in SSC's Social Sciences Division, including courses in Rules of Evidence and American Federal Government, and has instructed for Oklahoma CLEET reserve academies. He earned his J.D. from the University of Tulsa College of Law and a B.S. in business administration from Oklahoma State University.

Prochaska joins SSC following seven years on the faculty at Lake Erie College in Painesville, Ohio, where she served as associate professor of criminal justice and co-director of the Tower Honors Program. Her campus service included roles as assessment liaison for the School of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences and membership on the Faculty Senate

Executive Committee.

"What specifically motivated me to come to SSC was the size, the mission statement, and the values of the College. I have a passion for preparing students to be successful in all aspects of their lives, including teaching them how to think critically about real-world problems, communicate with others who may bring a different perspective and to understand that learning is something that does not stop after formal education is complete," Prochaska said.

Her scholarship includes two peer-reviewed journal articles, a third article forthcoming, and a book chapter published in 2022. Topics include political participation and crime, maternal incarceration and delinquency and perceptions of cyberbullying.

Prochaska has delivered dozens of conference presentations since 2013, including recent talks at the Ohio Council of Criminal Justice Education, the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences and the American Society of Criminol-

ogy

Her teaching experience covers a range of undergraduate courses — among them Introduction to Criminal Justice, Criminological Theory, Methods of Field Research, Juvenile Delinquency, Constitutional Law and Criminal Law and Procedure — delivered in multiple formats.

Prochaska earned a Ph.D. in Criminal Justice from the University of Arkansas at Little Rock in 2018 and an M.A. in Criminal Justice from the same institution in 2016. She holds a B.S. in criminal justice from Northeastern State University, awarded in 2013.

"In my first year, my biggest goal is to build partnerships with criminal justice agencies in the community so I can bring in guest speakers but more importantly help students build their networks early," Prochaska said.




